
Gospel Reflection

My Dear people,

Travelling is a traditional feature of the Christmas season. My memories of Christmas as a child are travelling from Port Macquarie to Taree to spend a few days with my cousins and uncles and aunts, and especially Grandma Schmitzer. People still go to great trouble, travel great distances, to be with their families. The extra buses and trains and planes are barely able to cope.

When you come to think about it, travel was also very much a part of the first Christmas. As soon as she knew she was pregnant Mary set out from Nazareth to visit her cousin Elizabeth who, she had heard, was also pregnant. Nine months later she went up again to Judaea to be registered in the government census. There she gave birth to her Son.

The story of the first Christmas also includes the journey of the shepherds who, when they heard the news of the birth of a Saviour, went over the Bethlehem to see the Baby. And the story includes the journey of the Wise Men who travelled all the way from the East bringing gifts. Soon afterwards Mary and Joseph were on the road again. The Child had to be taken in haste to Egypt to escape the rage of Herod.

But the most important journey that first Christmas was surely the one described by Saint John in the Prologue of his Gospel. We sing of it in our carols: "He came down to earth from heaven who is God and Lord of all". This mysterious journey is the essence of Christmas.



From the beginning, our human story has been one of infidelity to the Creator.

Like Adam and Eve in the Garden we had hidden ourselves from the Lord. Our world is not the kingdom of peace it was meant to be - it has been a Tower of Babel, full of failure and betrayal, selfishness and sin, skeletons in cupboards, guilt and helplessness.

The first Christmas is God's response to this tragic situation. God is not content to stay at home waiting for the Prodigal to return. God goes out and follows the Prodigal into the land of sin. In the language of Saint John, God become flesh, "pitches his tent among us" to use the literal Greek, becomes visible in the earthy messiness of our human condition.

Referring to Christ as the original Good Samaritan, Saint Augustine wrote: "The man lying on the road is the whole human race. When the Immortal One, the Holy One, was far removed from us because we were sinners, He came down to us, so that He, the stranger, might become our neighbour".

This journey of incarnation, whose beginning we celebrate at Christmas, is essentially a journey of forgiveness. God is taking the initiative. God is breaking the deadlock. The God we found difficult to love because we could not see Him, has now become visible. As such, He is easier to love and serve. By word and example He becomes our Way, our Truth, and our Life. His death will prove the incredible depths of God's love.

I wish you all every blessing for Christmas. My gift has been the offering of a Novena of Masses for your intentions.
