I learnt one great lesson from my years in prison camps. I learnt how a person becomes evil and how he becomes good.

Gradually I came to realise that the line which separates good from evil passes not between states, or between classes, or between political parties, but right through every human heart. Even in hearts that are overwhelmed by evil, one small bridgehead of good is retained. And in the best of all hearts. there remains an unuprooted small corner of evil.

My dear people,

The farmer in Jesus's parable planted good seed in his field and expected a wonderful harvest. Soon the seeds began to sprout, and it looked as if the farmer's expectations would be fulfilled. But then later on he discovered weeds growing among the young shoots of wheat—not just one here and there, but weeds everywhere, much so that the wheat seemed to have disappeared.

Sooner or later, weeds begin to appear in the field of our lives—a friend betrays us, our spouse may prove unfaithful, a business partner takes us 'for a ride'. The badness of bad people we expect, and we can arm ourselves against it. But the badness of good people can take us by surprise and, of course, it hurts us. For a while we can become very negative, tending to see everything as bad.

What was the farmer to do? The obvious answer was to pull the weeds out. But this would be impossible. The weeds were growing so close to the stalks of wheat that one could not be uprooted without the other. So what did he do? Well, firstly, he calmed down. This enabled him to see things in perspective. He would have to be humble and patient. He would have to work hard on the wheat, coaxing and encouraging it with the hope that it would outgrow the weeds.

We must never despair. The world is a mixture of light and darkness, good and evil. Wheat and weeds grow side by side in the same person, you and I included. No one understands this better than Our Lord. Even in His own small garden—the twelve apostles—which He tended carefully for three years, the weeds persisted, yet He did not write it off. Evil, of course, must be resisted, but in such a way that we do not further evil in the process. Evil can only be overcome by good.

The farmer set to work. He concentrated on the wheat. He noticed that it was by reaching and straining upwards that it grew. By making the wheat struggle harder, the weeds were actually having a beneficial effect on the crop.

Because of the existence of evil we have to struggle. It's a lifelong struggle. But it is through struggle that we grow. So, the presence of evil could even be said to be necessary. Unless we had to make choices between good and evil we would never grow in virtue.

On harvest day the farmer separated the weeds from the wheat, reaping a fine harvest—not one hundred percent, but the quality was excellent. He felt this harvest had given him more satisfaction than many others for the victory was hard-won.

This parable of Our Lord is both realistic and optimistic. In the end, good triumphs. Truth and goodness are invincible.
