

My dear people,

Many parents may relate to this story. Peter and Anne raised their four children but are now alone. They feel disappointed and sad. Anne tells us why.

"We did everything we could for those children. We wanted them to have the things we didn't have. We bought a house, and Peter had to work overtime to be able to keep up with the mortgage repayments. Life was a constant struggle, but the children never lacked anything. They had a lot of illness when they were very young but, thank God, in time they grew out of them. Though we saw some of our neighbours going out regularly, and others going abroad for their holidays, we could never afford that. But we gladly sacrificed these things for the sake of the children.

"We sent them to good schools. They never lacked money for books or school outings. They were always well dressed. We taught them good values. We taught them their religion, and we tried to give them good example. Look how they have repaid us. They say that good example rubs off. Well, in our case, it didn't.

"John the eldest, quit university and went into the pub business. He now owns three pubs. But money has become his God. He sends us a couple of bottles at Christmas, but we hardly ever see him. Anne, a teacher, married a fellow with a big job. They don't believe in having children. We get cards from them from exotic places, but they rarely come to see us. Peter has three children and seemed to be happily married. But then he suddenly left his wife and went to live with a young girl. He never shows up. Paul, our baby, is still unmarried. He's touring the world like a hippie and doesn't believe in working or settling down. None of them go to church. What more could we have done for them?"

There is great heart-break in religious parents who see their children abandoning the Faith and/or adopting a lifestyle which they regard as immoral. It is only natural to expect a return to love, and hurtful when it doesn't come. It is terrible to feel taken for granted or even used. What hurt Peter and Anne most was not the ingratitude of their children, but rather the way their children turned out. They are sad for themselves but even more sadder for their children.

Today's Mass Readings seem to suggest that even God sometimes feels like this. The words of the First Reading, "What more could I have done for my vineyard that I have not done?' is a cry from the heart. (It is the theme of a hymn called the Reproaches which the Church sings on Good Friday.) In spite of all the love He showed His people, Israel, all God received in return was utter ingratitude.

What sort of fruit did God expect from His people? He looked for peace and got war; for true worship and got idolatry; for justice in their dealings with one another, and got injustice, corruption, and the exploitation of the poor and the weak; for goodness, and got evil; for sharing, and got greed; for community, and got snobbery; for humility, and got pride; for godly living, and got a pagan lifestyle.

Israel's story is to some extent our story too. God wants us to make the best use we can of the gifts and opportunities He has given us so that we may grow as His children. We often fail to respond to this love. Yet God never writes us off. He gives us chance after chance.

We fail, of course, not just as individuals but as Church. The Church is the vineyard Christ planted and tended with such care that He gave His life for it. He looks to us, His followers in every age, the tenants of His vineyard, to produce the fruit of justice, love, and peace. It's a great privilege, but a great challenge too.

As a comment on the story of Peter and Anne, I often think that too many parents wrongly blame themselves for the way their children turn out. Parents can only do their best, and only they know if they have done their best. They can only give their children the tools they need for facing life. It is up to the children to use those tools. And on the question of faith, we can't give the Faith to others. Faith is a gift from God, a personal relationship. Parents can only guide. The rest is up to the child. And never forget the power of prayer. Look at St Monica - her good life and her prayers brought her husband, her mother-in-law, and her son to the Faith.
