My dear people,

You're throwing a party. You set the date, and draw up a list of the people you want to invite, You send out the invitations with an RSVP. You can expect three kinds of responses.

- 1) Some accept. Of course, there are degrees of acceptance. Some may accept half-heartedly—they feel obliged to come. But others feel honoured to have been invited.
- 2) Others refuse the invitation. Every refusal disappoints you, perhaps even hurts you. But at least you know where you stand. There are also degrees of refusal. Some would like to come but have a prior engagement. Others just aren't interested.
- 3) But there is a third way of responding—by not responding at all. It is a response in itself. It is the worst response of all. It's worse than a refusal. When people refuse the invitation, you know where you stand. Here, you don't. Have you done something to offend them? Perhaps the invitation got lost in the mail? And if you ring them, they might say: "Oh, I meant to reply, but..." 'I meant to'- how empty you feel, especially if you thought you were friends!

God doesn't force us—He invites us. A command can't be so easily ignored—but an invitation can. Advertisers can't force us to buy a product, but they do resort to all kinds of gimmicks. God doesn't act like that. He has too much respect for our freedom. But perhaps we're so busy, and our lives are so full, that even God has difficulty breaking through.

The excuses that kept the invited guests in today's parable from the wedding weren't bad excuses. In most cases they were perfectly good—one man wanted to attend to his land, another to his business. But this is what makes the excuses so dangerous. We don't see them as posing a threat!

The greatest danger facing us is not that we might abandon God and turn to evil—it is rather that we might just ignore His invitation. To ignore God's invitation altogether is the worst form of refusal. It implies indifference. Indifferent people are the hardest to convert. And what is God inviting us to? Intimacy with Himself, especially through the Sacraments. And the rules are the same as those for intimacy with any friend—you must enter into the mind of other, spend time with the other. Christ is as truly present in the Sacraments now as He was physically when on earth. This is why, for those who refuse the invitation, or are just indifferent, God will always remain an acquaintance—never a friend. It's why we pray for the souls in Purgatory—some metals take longer to soften.

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Next Sunday is **World Mission Sunday**, and, as usual, special Envelopes will be provided for your donation. Australia's focus this year will be to support the work of the Sisters of the Immaculate Heart who are located in Nha Trang in Vietnam. The Sisters work tirelessly to combat malnutrition, as well as providing clean drinking water and accessible health and education services for the forgotten farming families in remote coastal communities. We are in debt to Vietnam, of course, for the many priests serving in our communities.

Wednesday's SYDNEY MORNING HERALD contained an article by journalist Matt Wade, "2017 shapes as best year ever to be alive", discussing the great advances worldwide in combating poverty and raising the standard of health, and he quotes philanthropists Bill and Melinda Gates. But the Gates have a worry. "They sense the commitment of rich nations to help those in poorer ones is wavering. There is now 'more doubt than usual about the world's commitment to development', the report warns. Not only has the administration of US President Donald Trump proposed 'big cuts' to foreign aid, but 'a similar mood of retrenchment has taken hold on other donor countries'.

"Sadly, Australia is a prime example. The Abbott and Turnbull governments have slashed Australia's overseas aid budget. Malcolm Turnbull is now responsible for the lowest level of aid spending as a share of gross national income in 60 years. Despite the spectacular falls in poverty and ill health in recent decades, 5 million children are still expected to die this year from preventable causes. This is not the time to be stingy."

Australia's commitment to overseas aid is a national disgrace, and we should let our politicians know how we feel about this, especially in election years. This situation, of course, places more and more strain on non-government agencies, one of which is CATHOLIC MISSION.
