

My dear people,

NOVEMBER is the month when our thoughts are, in a special manner, directed to the reality of an existence beyond this present one. We are reminded of that eternal blessedness which we call 'Heaven', for which God has destined all humankind. However, we also remember that, when this earthly part of the journey is completed, we may not yet be worthy of that ultimate prize. There exists that state of being purified which we call 'Purgatory'. At the moment of death, not only shall we see God as He really is, we shall also see ourselves are we really are. For some, this will be very painful.



The Month of November reminds us of a wonderful truth of our Faith—what we name in the Creed as **the Communion of Saints**: the union of the Church on

earth, the Church in Heaven, and the Church in Purgatory. Between those who are in Purgatory and ourselves there is no unsurmountable barrier. The fact of our dear ones' departure neither separates them from our love nor deprives them of our aid. At Requiem Masses the priest prays during the Eucharistic Prayer: "Remember (our dead). In baptism they died with Christ, may they also share his resurrection". We ask God to be mindful of our dead—not that He has forgotten them. Rather, we are reminding ourselves that **our** remembering them at the Sacrifice of the Mass can be the means of their entrance into Heaven.

So many of our dear ones suffered greatly during their lives, having been invited by Christ to share the heavy load of the Cross. Hope is the virtue which enables the Christian to face any difficulty or fear, and even death's dark gateway, confident in the power of God's love. This hope assures us that their passing—and ours when the times comes—is not just a merciful end to pain. We are certain that our death is the dawning of our eternal day, the awakening to everlasting joy.

We, the living, pray not only for those whom we ourselves have personally known, or who have shared our Catholic Faith, but also for those countless millions who have been created in God's love. So many did not even hear of God or His incarnate Son. For these, too, Christ our Saviour lived and died and rose from the dead. We can easily appreciate how our material charity here on earth can help those we have never seen in other parts of the world. We must be equally confident that we can in prayer come to the spiritual aid of all those who have died.

Praying for the dead challenges our faith, our hope, and our love: our **faith** in a God who is love, and who sent His Son that we might have life to the full; our **hope** in the power of Christ's death and resurrection—a power strong enough to save us; and a **love** that transcends the grave and conquers death itself.

We pray for our dead obviously because we believe human death is not the end. In faith we know that we have already begun to live the life that the Saints now fully enjoy and the dead aspire to. This unites us—the one Communion of Saints—and it allows us to influence each other. We need the prayers of the Saints in heaven; the souls in Purgatory need our prayers. It is good to remember that the souls in Purgatory are good friends to have—while they can no longer pray for themselves, they can and do pray for us. Once in Heaven they will certainly remember us who have helped them get there.

By our prayers for the dead, especially by offering the Sacrifice of the Mass, we are fulfilling the great command of Christ to love one another as He has loved us. This command of charity extends not only to those we know on earth, but also to those who have already left the earth.
