My dear people,

This week the NSW Parliament will discuss a Bill on assisted dying or euthanasia. Such a Bill was passed last year by the Canadian Parliament, "a shocking, appalling landmark decision to the utter failure of government, and indeed all society, to care truly, authentically and humanely for the suffering and vulnerable in our midst" commented the Vatican Newspaper.

Wrote the Canadian Bishops: "No institution, person, ideology or legislation is entitled to threaten or undermine the sacredness of both the dignity of each individual person and the very gift of life itself. We are called, as a community of compassionate individuals, to respect and protect the continuum of life from conception to natural birth, honouring a vision of the human person on his/her present earthly existence as well as life beyond the grave. Catholics and indeed all people of good will have a moral and societal obligation to protect the vulnerable, comfort the suffering, and accompany the dying".

"The intentional taking of any human life—be it an elderly person, a child, a vulnerable adult, an embryo, a dying person—is truly a grave and morally unjustifiable act. Our society needs to reject all offences against life itself: murder, genocide, suicide, abortion, euthanasia, and physician-assisted dying. The purposeful termination of human life via a direct intervention is not a humane action whatsoever. We ought to look instead to minimizing the pain and suffering of the dying and those who are tempted to end their lives, not eradicate their existence. Let us strive to help the sick and incapacitated find meaning in their lives, even and especially in the midst of their suffering. Let us comfort those facing terminal illness or chronic conditions through our genuine presence, human love and medical assistance. Let us, as a society and as individuals, choose to walk with them, in their suffering, not contribute to eliminating the gift of life."

Most people who think that euthanasia and assisted suicide should be legal are not thinking the whole issue through. They think about what it would be like to suddenly become incapacitated, and consider such a life as undignified or worthless. Perhaps they consider severely disabled people as having no quality of life. **Our dignity and quality of life don't come from what we can or cannot do.** Dignity and quality of life are not matters of efficiency, proficiency and productivity. They come from a deeper place—from who we are and how we relate to each other. Pope Francis beautifully illustrated this point when honouring Pope Benedict on his 65th anniversary as a priest. Pope Benedict is spending his final years in a life of prayer for the Church. This is a great service to the Church, said Pope Francis.

Our Society, of course, has lost sight of the sacred nature of human life. When people today speak about a "good death", they usually refer to an attempt to control the end of one's life. The Christian notion of good death, however, is death not as a good end but a good transition, that requires faith, proper acceptance and readiness. The dimension of the Paschal mystery of suffering, death and resurrection has been absent from our end of life conversation and discussion. When life is not respected, then other rights will sooner or later be threatened. As St John Paul II wrote: "a right to die will inevitably give way to the duty to die".

Pope Francis has criticized those who support a right to euthanasia for people suffering painful or terminal illness, saying that they spread the "lie" that lives affected by such illnesses are not worth living. He speaks of the value of spending time with "these brothers and sisters who, thanks to our closeness and affection, feel more, loved and comforted".

Mercy Killing strikes to the very core of who we are and what we believe. Euthanasia must be called a false and misguided mercy. True compassion leads to sharing another's pain, not killing the person whose suffering we cannot bear. The best way to know if we are a Christian society is to see how we treat our most vulnerable people, the ones with little or no claim on public attention, the ones without beauty, strength or intelligence. The historian Eusebius noted that during a time of plague in Rome, the well-to-do fled the city. It was the Christians who stayed behind to care for the sick, at great risk to their health. "All day long some of them tended to the dying and to their burial, countless numbers with no one to care for them. Others gathered together from all parts of the city a multitude of those withered from famine and distributed bread to them all." The Emperor Justinian complained to one of his pagan priests, "(They) support not only their poor, but ours as well".

The legalization of euthanasia and physician-assisted suicide does not render physician assisted suicide and euthanasia morally right. They remain grave sins against the love to God, and stand as an affront to human life and dignity. We must continue to advocate for new and major initiatives in palliative care—the only truly human answer to end of life challenges.
