

INVITATION TO THE CHRISM MASS – WEDNESDAY 28 MARCH 7.30PM

Each year during Holy Week the Chrism Mass is celebrated at St Francis Xavier Cathedral. If you have never participated, you are missing one of the most solemn and significant liturgies of our Church. During the Mass, the Priests of the Diocese renew their commitment to priestly service; Bishop Brian blesses the oil of catechumens (for Baptism) and the oil of the sick (for Anointing of the Sick) and consecrates the oil of chrism (for Baptism, Confirmation, the Ordination of clergy and the consecration of altars). The oils are then distributed to clergy to be used during the year with their local communities. Everyone is warmly invited to join Bishop Brian and our clergy to celebrate this significant event in the life of the Church.

My dear people,

Our memories are a very important part of our lives. But we should never live on memories alone, for we should always be making the most of the present. But what we are **now** is a result of what we **have been** - the people we have known and loved (or not loved), and the experiences we have lived. We are (or we should be) in a state of change, and so there is a continuity of part, present, and future.

The Church lives on memories—the memories of God's love. The Church could not act in the present, nor have the courage to face the future, if it were not for her memories of what God has promised and of what He has already done. Lent and Easter are especially a time of memories. Through the Scripture Readings she has chosen and through her celebration of the Liturgy, the Church will once more try to come closer to God by **remembering** His love.

In the Liturgy **remembering** takes on a unique dimension. God is not a God of the past, He is the God of the NOW. We cannot think of the past concerning God without realizing that He is present with us **now**. Certainly, this was the understanding of the Jews. They believed that every time they came together to celebrate the Passover, the God who saved their ancestors actually became present to them **as they remembered**. They were taking part in the original Passover years and even centuries afterwards.



So, when Jesus told His apostles to "do this in **memory** of me" they understood the implications. Every time they would "break the Bread", as the Mass was first called, the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus would become **present.** And so Christians from that time on believed that at Mass they were participating in the actual events of Christ's saving death and resurrection. In fact, a Christian was recognised and defined as one who sacramentally, or in SIGN, celebrated the sacred mysteries of Christ. (Sadly, the Protestant Reformation divided Christians on this basic issue)

Salvation, then, is always a thing of the present. It is not something that **has** happened or **will** happen. Salvation is happening **now.** And so the Church will in this coming HOLY WEEK, in a more solemn way than usual, celebrate what God has done and is doing for us in Christ. It is important, then, that we prepare ourselves **this** week in spirit. We should enter Holy Week in a spirit of inner peace. A famous German Benedictine nun in a book on Holy Week uses the beautiful image of a ship entering port after a long voyage—the weeks of effort and strain will be over. The Church is like that ship. Lent has been a long voyage, but now in Holy Week the ship will have entered port. It will be time to rest in the Passion of Christ. We should do our best that week to take time off for God.
