At this week's Parish Pastoral Council meeting a suggestion was put forth to establish a Children's Religious Library.

Today, children seldom have the opportunities to read good, interesting, enticing and challenging religious books that can help them develop and expand their knowledge of their Catholic Faith, Jesus' teaching, learn stories from the Bible, lives of the Saints and the teachings of the Catholic Church.

The suggestion met with 100% approval. A number of fundraising activities will be organised to raise money to purchase books. The library will cater for children from the age of 3 years up to young teenagers. It will operate after the Sunday Masses.

Any family who would like to donate religious books in good condition could leave them in a box under St Anne's Statue at the back of the Church. Further information will be provided as the project gets underway.

My dear people,

Some years ago the 'Sydney Morning Herald' carried the headline "The Great Betrayal". It followed the discovery of a major act of cheating in Rugby League. The article began, "There's a little boy who got a footy jumper for Christmas. He can't wait to wear it at the season kick-off or the first bounce in a few weeks. It doesn't matter whether it is a Manly jumper or an Essendon jumper. Every night he goes to sleep, he gazes at his team's poster, dreaming of the day he grows up into that line-up. Now? A cloud hangs over every poster of every team in every young child's bedroom." Now, a mother writes in last week's 'Herald' of the devastation her 8-year-old son feels. Steve Smith was his idol.

Yes, there has been a betrayal, and the terrible message being given to a younger generation is that sport is always about winning - that message is bad enough, but winning at any cost?

All this is actually part of something bigger. Australia has a reputation world-wide as one of the great sporting nations. But it is gaining a reputation, too, as a secular or God-less nation. Our sporting arenas are overflowing at the weekend, while many churches are half-empty. The cost of a family going to a sporting fixture would far outweigh what they would have put on the 'plate' at church. The 'Herald' article also noted that "despite tightening budgets, (families) pay Foxtel \$100 a month to watch it all." It is the story of Cain and Abel all over again - when we cheat God, we start to cheat each other. Ultimately, we are cheating ourselves. "What if one should gain the whole world, and lose one's soul?"

But I think the Greater Betrayal is a spiritual one - Catholic parents who are hiding the treasure of the Faith from their children. It could be said that today's young parents are not to blame - they seem not to have been taught the basics of the Faith. And it seems their parents weren't, either. Something happened when Religious left the schools, and the Bishops did not foresee the consequences. I am certainly forever grateful to the nuns who taught me the Faith.

However, there are still many opportunities for the modern parent to deepen their faith. Most parishes are still staffed by priests who provide Mass and the Sacraments on a regular, if not daily, basis. Many parishes provide faith programmes. Sacramental programmes are constantly offered with the opportunity for parent and child to learn together. (Thank God for Sister Joan). And many parents still have the example of their own faith-filled parents and grandparents to emulate. They are not living in a vacuum.


But there seems a great unwillingness among the younger population to change their ways, caught up as they are in a secular society. As adults they are, in a sense, free to do what they like. But once they present a child to the Church for Baptism, everything changes. "Do you promise to do everything in your power to bring up your child in the practice of the Faith?" the priest asks. "We do," vow the parents (provided this does not interfere with Little Nippers, Junior Football or dancing lessons).

I see a problem in parents confusing their children - enrolling them in a Catholic school, then teaching them by their example that the Commandments are not really necessary. I single out three: the First, that nothing comes before God, neither family, nor work, nor recreation; the Third, keeping holy the Lord's Day by attending Mass (so easier now with Vigil Masses); and the Sixth, I not infrequently listen to children telling me about Mummy's new boyfriend or Daddy's new girlfriend. (When I was a child, a Court would have removed children from such 'moral danger').

Then there is the terrible example children see of adults in a state of serious sin approaching the altar for Holy Communion without prior Confession. Some time ago Pope Benedict spoke to priests about the need to remind their people that God should not be treated in such a casual manner.

I see a problem, too, in Catholic schools staffed by non-practising Catholics. The school can hardly be seen, then, as a force for evangelisation.

Yes, I think the modern Catholic child is being betrayed. A Benedictine Nun said to me recently, "For the first time in Christianity, one generation is not passing the Faith on to the next."
