PENTECOST SUNDAY – YEAR B

20 MAY 2018

READINGS: Acts 2:1-11; 1 Cor 13:3-7 or Gal 5:16-25;
Jn 20:19-23 or Jn 15:26-27, 16:12-15.

Jewish tradition saw Pentecost as the feast of the giving of the Law by God to Moses on Mount Sinai. According to legend, a mighty wind turned to fire and a voice proclaimed the Law. The fire then split into seventy tongues of fire corresponding to the seventy nations of the world. The Law was proclaimed not only to Israel but to all humankind.

St Luke sees a parallel in the coming of the Holy Spirit - a mighty wind and tongues of fire coming upon the group of disciples. Now it is the Good News of the Gospel that is being proclaimed, a proclamation that has undone the sentence of the Tower of Babel and has re-united the scattered nations.



My dear people,

The story of the Tower of Babel in the Old Testament is a symbol of man's attempts to create on earth a paradise without any recourse to God. After they had eaten the forbidden fruit, God sent forth the man and the woman from Paradise. But what did they do? They undertook to build a Paradise of their own, from which they endeavoured to banish God. But what kind of Paradise was it? The end result was a complete breakdown of communication. The effort is still going on. We have massive highways, supersonic jets, nuclear power stations, manned space flights. Yet we cannot live at peace with each other.

Pentecost is pictured by St Luke as a reversal of what happened at Babel. Gathered in Jerusalem there is a small group of people, ordinary people with little faith in their own abilities, but great faith in God. They set out to build a 'tower' of a different kind. This 'tower' took the form of a new community which would become a spiritual stairway to heaven.

On Pentecost Sunday the apostles set out to build his new community. They spoke a new language - the language of love and co-operation, a language all people of good will understand. Today is the anniversary of this great happening. It is the birthday of the Church, the community of the followers of Jesus. On this day, thanks to the coming of the Holy Spirit, the infant Church took its first steps. It is made up not of saints but of sinners. Down the ages it has had its share of problems and setbacks. It is still being built. Part of it is assembled here in Unanderra. We assemble at the Eucharist each week not as rivals but as friends. Factors which normally divide people - such as class, colour, age, wealth - count for nothing here. Here we are only family under God.

At Pentecost, God reversed the disaster of Babel which divided and confused the unity of the human family. The Holy Spirit makes known to all peoples the one true God, and so creates from the many languages of people one voice to profess one faith. This is the wonderful thing that began on Pentecost Sunday. We not only find shelter in this tower - we are also builders of it.
