THE MOST HOLY BODY & BLOOD OF CHRIST (CORPUS CHRISTI) – YEAR B

3 JUNE 2018

READINGS: Ex 24:3-8; Heb 9:11-15; Mk 14:12-16, 22-26

The theme of covenant dominates all the three Readings today. The First Reading from the book Exodus describes the ratification of the covenant on Mount Sinai between God and



Israel. The covenant was sealed with the blood of animals, blood being a symbol of life which belongs exclusively to God. The sprinkling of the people with blood symbolises the fact that God is sharing His life with them.

Jesus has established a new covenant, of which the former one was only a symbol. Like the old covenant it, too, was sealed with blood, but now it is the Precious Blood of Jesus. Jesus institutes a new rite, the Eucharist, which will be a perpetual reminder of the intimate bond that exists between God and us. In the Eucharist Jesus shares His very life with us.



I have nothing. Yet I know that


because I have You, I have everything.

My dear people,

Sometimes it is necessary to be alone, for the soul requires solitude in order to maintain its individuality. But we couldn't live like that all the time - we'd go mad. The fact is that we are remarkably dependent on one another. We need other people in our lives for support, affirmation, encouragement, companionship. They nourish us, and we nourish them.



LORD, may the reception of your blessed sacrament cleanse us from sin and unite us all in you.

Today, people are schooled in individualism with the result that they find community difficult. There is a lot of loneliness. Many are crying out for a friend, a companion, a sense of belonging. The word 'companion' is actually a remarkable word. It comes from two words: **cum** which means with, and **panis** which means bread. So a 'companion' literally means someone with whom I share bread. It's not everyone you enjoy a meal with. There has to be a bond. And that bond is deepened by the sharing of food and drink.

When people invite us to their table they offer us more than food. They offer us trust, welcome, and friendship. We feel honoured. The talk is as much a part of the fare as the food. Afterwards we feel nourished, not only in body but also in heart and spirit.

By inviting us to partake of the sacred food of the Eucharist Jesus makes us His companions and friends. And in doing so we ought to become companions and friends to one another. Does this happen? Nowadays a person could come to Mass in a car, and go away afterwards without making contact with any one. We've met God, but have we met our fellow Christians, our neighbours? The two realities are linked - we are in communion with Jesus so that we can be in communion with one another. A person could be broken and no one would know, no one would care. Building community is not that hard. It just takes ordinary friendliness. The first step is to become acquainted.

If we were to go into the room of the Last Supper at the first Mass, we would immediately get the sense of bonding - Jesus and His companions sharing a meal. In our churches people sometimes sit as far apart as possible. Why? There seems to be a reluctance to meet each other. And if we don't meet, we're not actually sharing. We all need Christ - that's obvious. But we also need each other. To be a true believer in today's world can be a lonely business. This is where the community comes in. We are a community of believers whose common faith strengthens the faith of each individual. The first Christians supported each other. They forgave each others offences, shared their possessions, and fostered the spirit of community. It was so obvious that it quickly attracted others to join them. Do our celebrations of Mass make others interested in seeing what we are on about?



Friday marks the feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, a day of special devotion. It is immediately followed by the Feast of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, for Mary mirrors Christ. Our Diocese was dedicated to the Immaculate Heart of Mary by Saint John XXIII.
