THE BIRTH OF ST JOHN THE BAPTIST

24 JUNE 2018

READINGS: Vigil: Jer 1:4-10; 1Pet 1:8-12; Lk 1:5-17.

Day: Is 49:1-6; Acts 13:22-26; Lk 1:57-66, 80.

The Feast dates back to the fourth century, ie. to the period immediately following the great persecutions, the time when the Church began to openly profess the Faith. The biblical accounts of the striking events that accompanied John's entrance into the world, and the statements of Jesus Himself about His Precursor, make it understandable that the early Church should have esteemed and venerated the Baptist so highly.



According to Jesus, John is more than a prophet; "I tell you, of all the children born to women, there is no one greater than John" (LUKE 7:28). John's martyrdom won him veneration equal to that shown to the apostles and St Stephen.

In the Western Church the Feast occurs on 24 June, six months before the feast of Our Lord's birth (ct LUKE 1:36). By the sixth century the feast already had a Vigil, and three Masses used to be celebrated on the day itself as at Christmas.



My dear people,

In Chapter Two of his latest Letter to the Church, REJOICE AND BE GLAD, Pope Francis speaks of two subtle enemies of true holiness - they are not new and have been present in the Church since earliest times. The first is Gnosticism. Put simply, it means reducing religion to something of the mind and not of the heart. "Thanks be to God", says Pope Francis, "throughout the history of the Church it has always been clear that a person's perfection is measured not by the information or knowledge they possess, but by the depth of their love." 'Gnostics' do not understand this. They think they are superior to others because they are more highly educated and understand theology better. In point of fact, the more we know should always motivate us to respond more fully to God's love. We learn so as to live better. Theology and holiness are inseparable.



This is brought out well in the life of St Anthony of Padua. When his great gift of preaching was discovered, St Francis wrote to him and asked if he would teach theology to the Brothers, but warned him not to destroy their devotional life. St Francis recognised the temptation to turn Christianity into a set of intellectual exercises. And St Bonaventure, regarded as the second founder of the Franciscans, added that true Christian wisdom can never be separated from mercy towards our neighbour.

We do not have a monopoly on God. Gnosticism is a sinister ideology. It unduly exalts knowledge, considering its own vision of reality to be perfect. "When somebody has an answer for every question, it is a sign that they are not on the right road" says Pope Francis. What he means is that while knowledge is important in our understanding and practice of the Faith, we must always remember that God is mystery. We do not control God. He is present everywhere, and even in the lives of persons whose lives seem to be wrecked. St Augustine once remarked that when we think we have understood God, it is not God we have understood.


The second enemy to true holiness is Pelagianism (named after its proponent). The same power that the Gnostics attributed to the intellect, others now began to attribute to personal effort. They forgot the teaching of St Paul that everything "depends not on human will or effort, but on God who shows mercy" (ROMANS 9:16). We cannot buy grace, no matter how many Commandments we keep. Everything is a pure gift from God. We cannot earn His love for He has "first loved us" (1 JOHN 4:19).

Those who believe they are responsible for their own salvation become obsessed with the law and with "little things", they acquire a certain vanity about their ability to manage their lives, and are excessively concerned with programmes of self-help and personal fulfilment. "Some Christians spend their time and energy on these things," says Pope Francis, "rather than letting themselves be led by the Spirit in the way of love, rather than being passionate about communicating the beauty and the joy of the Gospel and seeking out the lost among the immense crowds that thirst for Christ."

Some groups of Christians give excessive importance to certain rules and ways of acting. The Gospel then tends to become constricted, deprived of its simplicity and allure. The life of grace becomes subject, then, to certain human structures. This can affect groups and movements, and explains why so often they begin with an intense life in the Spirit, only to end up fossilised - or corrupt! Even St Thomas Aquinas taught that the precepts added to the Gospel by the Church should be imposed with moderation "lest the conduct of the faithful become burdensome". Our religion would then become a form of servitude, something Our Lord criticised His own Church for.

God is the object and motive of our lives, and "love is the fulfilment of the law" (ROMANS 13). The face of God is reflected in so many other faces - the least, the most vulnerable, the defenceless, those in need. "Indeed," says Pope Francis, "with the scraps of this frail humanity, the Lord will shape His final work of art". What riches will never disappear? God and our neighbour.

These aberrations of Gnosticism and Pelagianism take various shapes, weighing the Church down and blocking her progress on the path to holiness. "So I encourage everyone to reflect and discern before God whether they may be present in their lives."
