



My dear people,

In chapter 3 of his Apostolic Letter REJOICE AND BE GLAD, Pope Francis answers the question "What must one do to be a good Christian?". Jesus explained what it means to be holy when He gave us the Beatitudes. They are the Christian's identity card. "Happy" or "blessed" are a synonym for "holy", expressing the fact that those faithful to God and His Word gain true happiness. Although Jesus' words may appear poetic, they are quite demanding.

<u>Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven</u>. The Gospel invites us to see where we find our security in life. Wealth ensures nothing. We can become so self-satisfied that we leave no room for God's Word, love of our brothers and sisters, and the enjoyment of the most important things in life. Interior freedom, says St Ignatius, can only be gained when we do not set our hearts on good health rather than bad, riches rather than poverty, honour rather than dishonour, a long life rather than a short one.



Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. From the beginning the world has been a place of conflict. To pigeonhole others on the basis of their ideas, customs, and even their way of speaking or dressing is the reign of pride and vanity, each person thinking he or she has the right to dominate others. Jesus, the King mounted on a donkey, proposes a different way of doing things. If we are constantly upset and impatient with others, we will end up drained and weary. St Therese tells us that "perfect charity consists in putting up with others' mistakes, and not being scandalised by their faults". St Paul suggests that if we have to correct others, then we do so with meekness, remembering we "too, could be tempted". People may think we are fools or idiots - so be it. Meekness is one of the fruits of the Holy Spirit.

<u>Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted</u>. The world has no desire to mourn - it would rather disregard painful situations or cover them up. But the Cross is always present. A person who sees things as they truly are and sympathises with pain and sorrow is capable of touching life's depths and finding authentic happiness. Such persons are unafraid to share in the suffering of others. They sense that the other is flesh of our flesh, and are not afraid to draw near, even to touch their wounds. Knowing how to mourn with others - that is holiness.

<u>Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled</u>. Hunger and thirst are intense experiences since they involve our instinct for survival. There are those who desire justice and yearn for righteousness with similar intensity. Jesus says they will be satisfied, for sooner or later justice will come, even if we may not always see the fruit of our efforts. How many people suffer injustice, standing by powerlessly while others divvy up the good things in life? True justice is shown towards those who are most vulnerable. "Seek justice, correct oppression, defend the fatherless, plead for the widow" (ISAIAH 1:17).

<u>Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy</u>. Mercy has two aspects. It involves giving, keeping and serving others, but it also includes forgiveness and understanding. "Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful. Judge not, and you will not be judged; condemn not, and you will not be condemned; forgive, and you will be forgiven; give, and it will be given to you" (LUKE 6:36-38). The yardstick we use for giving will measure what we receive. We should never forget this. "We need to think of ourselves as an army of the forgiven. All of us have been looked upon with divine compassion".

<u>Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God</u>. The Bible uses the heart to describe our real intentions, the things we truly seek and desire. God wants to speak to our hearts. There He desires to write His law. There can be no love without works of love. This Beatitude reminds us that the Lord expects a commitment to our brothers and sisters that comes from the heart. A heart that genuinely loves God and neighbour is a pure heart - it can see God.

<u>Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God</u>. We might think of the many endless situations of war in our world, yet we ourselves are often a cause of conflict, spreading and embellishing gossip, for example. Peacemakers build peace and friendship in society, excluding no-one, even those who are a bit odd, troublesome, difficult or demanding. It is hard work, and calls for great openness of mind and heart. Building peace is a craft that demands serenity, creativity, sensitivity and skill.

Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. The path Jesus proposes goes against the flow, making us challenge society by the way we live and, as a result, becoming a nuisance. Many people have been, and still are, persecuted simply because they take seriously their commitment to God and others. "Unless we wish to sink into an obscure mediocrity, let us not long for an easy life." The Beatitudes are not easy to live out - any attempt to do so will be viewed with negativity and ridicule. But when the New Testament tells us that we will have to endure suffering for the Gospel's sake, it speaks precisely of persecution. Such is evidenced by many contemporary martyrs.

There exists today a harmful error - Christians who separate these demands of the Gospel from their personal relationship with the Lord. Christianity then becomes a sort of NGO stripped of the mysticism so evident in the lives of St Francis, St Vincent de Paul, St Teresa of Calcutta, and many others. For these great Saints, prayer, the love of God and the reading of the Gospel in no way detracted from their passionate commitment to their neighbour - quite the opposite.
