For those parishioners wishing to donate by credit card or requiring a receipt, envelopes are provided.







My dear people,

Some people think that the Catholic Church is preoccupied with nothing but contraception, abortion and death. Even most Catholics are unaware of the existence and extraordinary breadth of Catholic social teaching, to be found in Papal letters and Encyclicals. It is said to be Catholicism's best-kept secret.

How's this from an Encyclical written by Pope Pius XI in 1931 in the wake of the 1929 financial crash? The Pope addressed the "irresistible power" grabbed by the directors of invested funds, slamming their hold over credit which was enabling them to "supply the life-blood to the entire economic body and grasping, as it were, in their hands the very soul of the economy, so that no-one dare breathe against their will". In a plea for better regulation, the Pope declared: "Free competition, and especially economic domination, must be kept within definite and proper bounds, and must be brought under effective control of the public authority." In the wake of the Royal Commission into the Banking and Superannuation Industries, these words could have been written in 2018!

For centuries, Popes and Councils of bishops have issued letters and documents that have added to the Church's tradition of teaching, analysing, and reflecting on the challenges of the day, whether it be peace, capitalism and socialism, international trade or ecology. This is because of the Gospel Commandment to love God and love neighbour. The imperative to love one's neighbour has no boundaries and no limits. The boundaries are not generational - our neighbours include future generations, and it is our responsibility to ensure they have a planet to live on.

Some say that religion and politics shouldn't mix. It's a rather generalised statement, as if the people voting and the politicians voted-in are 'tabula rasa', that is, empty slates with no history and no custom. When I go to the voting booth I am a citizen with a definite history. As a baptised Catholic, I have as much right as any other citizen — who may have no religion or has chosen 'politics' as their religion — to express my view. And because I have a religious view I should not be treated as 'below par'.

I was most disillusioned when in a former parish I wrote to my local Member expressing my views, and that of my people (in a signed petition) on same-sex marriage, to be given a reply that, no matter how many people opposed her, she would vote according to her own belief. So much for representative government! Catholics should be very careful who they vote for! They may be giving a sitting Member, or a newly-elected Member, unlimited rights to oppose the law of God.

So, as I said, some say that religion and politics don't mix. But Catholic social teaching is inherently political (small 'p') because the Church is concerned about the way the world is, and should be. The Church's social teaching (based on the Gospel) is about the fundamental dignity of the human person, a concern for the poor, the rights of workers, the priority of people over capital, the promotion of peace, and the active stewardship of the resources of the Earth. The active Catholic should be concerned



about the pain and sorrow of our time, especially the need and poverty of so many in the face of the greed, yet emptiness, of others.
