READINGS: Isaiah 62:1-5; Corinthians 12:4-11; John 2:1-11

The prophet Isaiah announces a message of hope for God's people at one of the lowest moments in their history. Jerusalem lay in ruins. Israel, once God's bride, was now like a widow bereft of her children. But there will be a new wedding feast, and God and His people will be like newlyweds again (**FIRST READING**).

The prophecy is fulfilled in Jesus who replaces the old order with the new, symbolised by the changing of water into wine.

In the Incarnation God has wedded heaven to earth (GOSPEL).

In the **SECOND READING** St Paul emphasises that the gifts we have been given by God are not for ourselves alone, but are meant to be put at the service of the community.

My dear people,

You are probably aware that the Orthodox Church places more emphasis on the Feast of the Epiphany (6 January) than on the Feast of Christmas (25 December). The Church's prayer-life always reflects her theology. The Jewish people always considered themselves the Chosen People - chosen by God as His very own, to the exclusion of all other peoples. But Saint Paul teaches that Christ is Lord of all. This was made so obvious when Christ manifested Himself at His Birth not only to Jews (represented by the shepherds) but also to the pagan Magi (representing the non-Jewish world).

The Greek word Epiphany actually means 'manifestation', and the early Church saw this spelt out in three events in Christ's life: the visit of the Magi when Christ 'shows' Himself to the peoples of the world; the Baptism when the Father presents His Son to the world with the words: "This is my Son in whom I am well pleased"; and Christ's first miracle at Cana which causes the disciples to first believe in Him. The three events are all celebrated by the Orthodox in the one feast of the Epiphany. The Roman Church celebrates the three events in three feasts. Today's Gospel is a relic of that ancient custom, and so while we have resumed the Ordinary Time of the Year, the Readings of this Second Sunday actually belong to the event we call the 'Epiphany'.

Today's Gospel mentions Our Lady. Only twice in his Gospel does Saint John refer to her, at the beginning and the end of Jesus' public life. Jesus refers to His Mother not by name but by title, 'woman'. For she is the woman spoken of in the Book of Genesis who would be the enemy of mankind's enemy because of her obedience to God. In the only words she speaks in Saint John's Gospel, Mary encourages us to imitate her obedience: "Do whatever he tells you".

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The Church this week has begun again what we call Ordinary Time - it will be interrupted in March for three months as we celebrate the very centre of our Faith, the Paschal Mystery, over Lent and Eastertime. The Church dons green again - a sign that we should be daily growing in Christ.

For a Catholic, this growth is impossible without the Mass. The Mass is the summit towards which our lives are oriented, and the fount from which all our blessings flow, for the Mass brings Christ to earth. In His Sacrifice which becomes present on our altars, Christ daily renews His covenant of love with us. In the Blessed Sacrament in our tabernacles, He unceasingly intercedes to His Father for us.

Every Sunday is a privileged moment for us on our journey. Every Sunday is an Easter. In our country, sadly, weekend sport and recreation has become a modern 'god'. This fact is not unknown to the Pope. In 2004, while speaking to the Bishops of New Zealand, Pope John Paul said "When Sunday becomes subordinate to a popular concept of 'weekend' and is unduly dominated by entertainment and sport, rather than being truly sanctified and revitalised, people remain trapped in a relentless and often meaningless pursuit of novelty and fail to experience the freshness of Christ's 'living water' (John 4:11)."

Compared to less recent times when, because of the



fast from midnight before, Mass could only be celebrated during the morning, it is now relatively easy to attend Mass. Pope Pius XII with the reduced fast introduced evening Masses, and the Second Vatican Council ushered in the concept of celebrating Vigil Masses for Sundays and Feasts. This was really nothing new in the history of Christianity. During the first three centuries while persecution raged and Christians were under curfew, and Sunday was still a workday in pagan Rome, Mass was always celebrated on Saturday evening, the Vigil of the Lord's Day, just as Jews began their Sabbath on Friday evening. The point is that observing the obligation to attend Mass on the Lord's Day has been made much more easy.

My advice is to attempt to attend Mass during the week on their day off, so as to maintain the essential communion with Christ. Please pray for your priests, pray for vocations.
