

FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME — YEAR C 3 FEBRUARY 2019

READINGS: Jer 1:4-5,17-19; 1 Cor 12:31-13:13; Luke 4:21-30

The **FIRST READING** tells of the call and commissioning of the prophet Jeremiah. Jeremiah never wanted to be a prophet, and was overwhelmed by the sheer burden of it. He stands out as a lonely figure whose mission seems to have failed. He is the supreme example, until Jesus Himself, of the triumph of failure.

The **GOSPEL** continues from last Sunday. Having heard Jesus preach in their synagogue, the people of Nazareth can't believe that Isaiah's prophecy could apply to Him. They rise up in fury and try to do away with Jesus immediately. But His hour has not yet come.


The Memorial of Our Lady of Lourdes each year on 11 February was established by Pope St John Paul as a worldwide day of prayer for the sick. In the Catholic mind, Lourdes has always been associated with the sick who have flocked there since Our Lady's apparitions to St Bernadette over 150 years ago. They go, seeking not just a cure but, more importantly, healing. For the main miracles are the many people who receive the grace to bear their sufferings with resignation and patience. Jesus came to show the Father's compassion on suffering humanity, and ordered His apostles to do the same.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick was already in evidence in the time of the apostles. St James writes: *"If one of you is ill, he should send for the elders of the church, and they must anoint him with oil in the name of the Lord and pray over him. The prayer of faith will save the sick man and the Lord will raise him up again; and if he has committed any sins, he will be forgiven."* (5:14-15).

This Sacrament has been much misunderstood. We used to call it Extreme Unction (or the 'last anointing'), and people presumed this was the sacrament for the dying. Happily, the Second Vatican Council restored the original intention of the sacrament — a source of comfort and healing for those suffering from serious illness or old age. Thus, the sacrament may be repeated several times during a person's lifetime.

The sacrament for the dying is Viaticum (from the Latin meaning 'Food for the Journey') — Holy Communion.

Because the Sacrament of the Sick involves the forgiveness of sins, only a bishop or a priest may administer it. As noted above, the sickness involved must be something serious and life-threatening. The aged are always eligible for this sacrament.



There will be a Mass here at Immaculate Conception on Saturday 9 February with Anointing of the Sick, followed by a luncheon. This is a Mass not just for the sick, of course. Come and pray for all who are ill within our parish and throughout the Church.

Speaking to the sick and their carers in Naples a few years ago, Pope Francis commented that human illness is a mystery, and can only be approached in a spirit of faith.

We must become accustomed to looking at Christ Crucified, at Him who took all our sickness and limitations upon Himself. Because of this, sickness can never be seen as 'failure'.

The sick are the flesh of Christ, they are Christ Crucified among us, they are the closest among us to Christ. "It is one thing to look at a Crucifix and it is another thing to look at a man, woman, child who is sick, in other words crucified there in their illness: they are the living flesh of Christ."

Pope Francis then asked all of us not to forget the 'protocol' on which we will be judged: "I was sick and you visited me." (cf MT 25:26).
