FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME — YEAR C 10 FEBRUARY 2019

READINGS: Isaiah 6:1-8; 1 Corinthians 15:1-11; Luke 5:1-11

The **FIRST READING** tells of the call of Isaiah to the ministry of prophecy. Despite a sense of his own sinfulness he responds without hesitation to the divine call. This prepares us for the **GOSPEL**, which deals with the call of the first disciples. Here again we see that it is God who takes the initiative and who provides the power for the response He requires.

Do I hear God asking “Whom shall I send?”. Am I prepared to answer “Here I am. Send me!”?

The **SECOND READING**

stresses the central belief of Christianity — Christ’s resurrection of which Paul is a witness.

My dear people,

Today's GOSPEL is often used in the context of priestly and religious vocations, but the passage has a message for all of us. What is impossible to achieve by human skill can be done by responding to Christ's invitation, for the apostles must have been thinking — Who is a carpenter to be telling professionals how to fish?

“Pay out your net for a catch” says Jesus to Peter. But there are many nets in which we can become entangled:

- * There is the delusive net the consumer society tries to throw before us. It can catch us in its mesh, convincing us we need more and more, then leaving us with the increasing worry about our ability to pay. Remember the old cliché: we are pressurised into buying things we don't want, with money we don't have, to impress people we don't like!
- * There is the net of building a successful image of ourselves, but often at the expense of neglecting the needs of others.
- * There is the net of the drug and alcohol culture, capturing those who have been overlooked or over-pressurised by society and the success syndrome.
- * There is the net of depression, despair, and suicide for those for whom life has lost its meaning, and living has lost its value.



Like St Peter we are all commissioned in one way or another to be 'fishers of people'. Hopefully, despite our brokenness, we have been caught up into the net of God's love. Somehow we must involve ourselves in spreading this net wider and wider so that others may be 'caught', too. But, who am I to do this? What qualifications do I have?

That would certainly have been uppermost in Peter's mind, as it was in the prophet Isaiah's in the FIRST READING. The prophets were not appointed by human authority, nor were they elected by the people. They were called and

commissioned by God Himself. All felt unworthy for the office. Look at the sequence of events in the passage — God's call, the individual's misgivings, God's reassurance, His commission to a specific task, and then the individual's acceptance of the call.

You and I have been called — it is the meaning of our Baptism and Confirmation. They were not just ceremonies — they were commissions to spread God's net and to bring into it every person we meet by showing them that God's love for them and His forgiveness of them is unconditional. This is our vocation and duty as Christians. We can do it because Christ has called us. We can't do it, however, if we are even partially trapped in one of the other nets.

We are reading from St Luke's Gospel. Relating the same incident, St John tells us that Peter and his friends netted 153 fish. Commentators tell us that in Christ's time zoologists believed there were 153 species of fish. The point is clear — every type of fish (big, small, beautiful, ugly) was taken into the net. It is a beautiful symbol of the Church — all are welcome.

Let us give a thought today, as is traditional when reading this Gospel, to priestly vocations — that we will always have bishops and priests who, with vision and love, will guide us into the ways of God's love.
