
19TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - YEAR C -11 August 2019

Into this month falls the celebration of Our Lady's Assumption — one of the Church's great Feasts — a Solemnity preceded by a Vigil. Next year will mark 70 years since Venerable Pope Pius XII declared this an Article of Faith, a Dogma, which must be believed by those who profess their faith in Christ. At the time, 1950, the Orthodox showed great surprise — not that they did not believe in this, but that the Roman Church should suddenly highlight what Christians had believed from the earliest centuries.

Theologians from East and West had written about this doctrine which had been celebrated in Jerusalem from the fourth century. In Catholic England, King Alfred the Great had declared 15 August a national holiday (remembering that 'holiday' actually means 'holy day'). Long before 1950, 15 August was a Holy Day of Obligation, and we had meditated on this 'mystery' in praying the Rosary. In secular France, 15 August is still a public holiday (No one likes to lose



a public holiday. What shall we do with the June long weekend when we become a Republic?).

It would seem that following the Second World War with its unprecedented wholesale destruction of human life, Pope Pius wished to highlight the beauty of the human body and its immortal destiny. The true meaning of Our Lady's Assumption bears this out.

In a homily he gave in 2010, Pope Benedict XVI pointed out that in this Feast we are not just admiring Mary. We are, in reality, reflecting on the eternal destiny of humankind. Benedict, a German, is a worthy successor of a fellow national, the late Fr Karl Rahner SJ who was one of the theological 'experts' at the Second Vatican Council. Like Rahner, Benedict was keen to delve into the 'meaning' of the Church's teachings – ie what do they say about human life itself? For if the Church is not helping us to understand our 'being', then it is actually saying nothing. And if the Church is wrong about its teaching on the Assumption (having made it a Dogma), then it is wrong on everything.

Long before the days of Vatican II, Pope Pius exercised a little collegiality. Before pronouncing the Definition, he wrote to all the Bishops of the world, asking them two questions: 1. Do your people believe in the mystery of Our Lady's Assumption; and 2. Do you agree that this should be solemnly defined?

There was unanimous agreement to the first question – and this is very important. If the universal Church was wrong on such a basic truth, then it would mean that Christ had deserted His Church. Only a few Bishops balked on the second question – not that they did not accept this teaching, only that they wondered whether it was necessary to proclaim a truth that everyone believed.

So what did Pope Pius actually say? Take this slowly – it is one long sentence: "The revered Mother of God, from all eternity joined in a hidden way with Jesus Christ in one and the same decree of predestination, immaculate in her conception, a most perfect virgin in her divine motherhood, the noble associate of the divine Redeemer who has won a complete trimph over sin and its consequences, finally obtained, as the supreme culmination of her privileges, that she should be preserved free from the corruption of the tomb and that, like her own Son, having overcome death, she might be taken up body and soul to the glory of Heaven where, as Queen, she sits in splendour at the right hand of her Son, the immortal King of the Ages." (Apostolic Constitution Munificentissimus Deus, 40, 1950).

In other words, our Faith proclaims that Mary, like Christ her Son, overcame death and is already triumphant in heavenly glory, in the totality of her being, "in body and soul". The Mother of God was so deeply integrated into Christ's mystery that at the end of her earthly life she already participated with her whole self in her Son's Resurrection. Faith is the key to Mary's greatness, as Elizabeth proclaimed. We are not to just admire Mary in her destiny. We are called to look at what God wants to do for us, too. We are to look at our final destiny. We exist because God loves us, because He conceived of us, because He called us to life. This means that not only a part of each of us will continue to exist, while other parts fall into ruin. On the contrary, it means that God knows and loves the whole of the human being — what we are. The whole of us, the whole of our life, is taken up by God and, purified in Him, receives eternity.

It is a truth which should fill us with joy. Nothing that is precious and dear to us in this world will be eliminated. "Why, every hair on your head is counted," said Jesus (Matthew 10:30). 15 August's Feast calls us to understand how precious in God's eyes is the whole of our life. We are a people who work to build a world open to God, a people full of joy because we can already glimpse the future.
