My Dear People,

There are many reasons why I should never have become a priest – I wasn't even born a Catholic. But God obviously had His reasons. I often reflect on a passage from St Paul – how God can use everything that happens in our lives, good and bad, for His own purpose: "We know that by turning everything to their good God co-operates with all those who love Him, with all those that He has called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28). Somehow God arranged circumstances and people to come together so that I am where I am now.

On the Schmitzer side, Grandmother was a living saint. She was still alive when I entered the Seminary (it happened to be on her birthday that year!). My mother became a Catholic when I was in my fourth year at Springwood. Four more years followed at Manly. It seemed such a long time in those days, and now I have been a priest six times that. Life was tough in those days, even a bit cruel. There were three hundred students in the two colleges combined – most left. (Some should never have entered). I remember the advice a senior student gave me once when I was thinking of leaving, advice I have often put into practice – never make a major decision when you're feeling emotional: give yourself some time and then, if you're feeling the same, take it for granted that your feelings are genuine.

I had grown up in Port Macquarie, and was taught by the Sisters of St Joseph of Lochinvar. They were good teachers. I thank them for giving me an appreciation of the basics of the Faith – a devotion to the Mass and the Blessed Sacrament, to Our Lady and the Saints, especially St Joseph. I sat for my Leaving Certificate after two years at Wauchope High. Going to a State School in those days was like stepping on to another planet. I was the only Catholic in my class.

Although she had always wanted me to be a priest, the last nun who taught me (Sr Columbkille) persuaded me to sit for the Public Service Exam – just in case! Perhaps the Bishop was testing my vocation – he thought I was perhaps a bit young to enter the Seminary at sixteen. The Public Service offered me a job in the Department of the Attorney General and of Justice. I had three postings in two years – North Sydney Court, Phillip Street Traffic Court, and Taree Court. In those days we had to learn to touch type (God knew I would later become a Bishop's Secretary!).

So, I entered the Seminary in 1962, the year the Second Vatican Council began. Church wise, they were exciting years. No-one really had any idea of what the Council would bring about. Then, having left the Seminary, it was a case of putting the Council's ideas into action, especially regarding the Liturgy.

I was ordained by Bishop John Toohey of Maitland in Our Lady of the Rosary Church in Taree. It was his first Ordination in English, and it was Taree's first Ordination in one hundred years. My first appointment was to Campbelltown – there were four priests there at that time: Fr Tom Grant, the Administrator, Fr Vince Whiteman, Fr Michael Healy, and myself. (That parish is now four parishes!). I was there for seven years. In that time, Bishop McCabe had retired, and Bishop Murray was ordained Wollongong's second Bishop. Bishop Murray took me to the Cathedral in 1977, and I was assistant for over three years. In 1980 I became Administrator until 1984. During that time I organised the Marian Congress of 1981, a wonderful event and a great expression of Faith. I will always be thankful for the help of the Catholic Women's League. We raised the entire cost of the Congress by selling whisky glasses and silver spoons!

In 1984 Bishop Murray asked me to become his Secretary, a role that continued for the next thirteen years. At that same time I was Chancellor of the Diocese, and for some years directing the work of the Marriage Tribunal. At night and weekends I was Parish Priest of Gwynneville and then Unanderra. Bishop Murray retired and Bishop Wilson replaced him. I asked to be relieved of Chancery work and went to the States for a short sabbatical – a wonderful experience. I then became Parish Priest of Albion Park, then later back to the Bishop's House for a second stint as Administrator (and part-time cook, it turned out to be!).

I have been through difficult times, but do not regret my vocation as a priest. I would have to say that it gets harder as time goes on – an increasingly secular society that no longer feels it needs God. A great disappointment is the seeming abandonment of the Church by the majority of families who make up our Catholic School Communities. I think we must face the fact that once our present congregations at Mass have gone to their eternal reward, their places will not be filled. I guess that somehow this is all in God's plan.

I hope I have made some small contribution to the life of the Church. With all my faults I can only marvel at God's patience with me. "If mercy has been shown to me, it is because Jesus Christ meant to make me the greatest example of his inexhaustible patience." (1 Timothy 1:16).
