Message from Fr Duane

This week it will be a great joy to celebrate the *First Holy Communion* of the children who were prepared in 2021 but could not receive the Sacrament last year due to Covid. The celebrations will take place in special weekday Masses, to avoid over-crowding at Sunday Masses. The ceremonies will take place on Wednesday evening at Unanderra, and Tuesday and Thursday evenings at West Wollongong. While the parish community will not be able to join the children in person, let's be sure to join them in spirit, praying for the children and families will all come to a deeper experience of the closeness and love of Jesus through his most precious gift of Himself in the Eucharist.

On *Friday 25th March 2022, on the Feast of the Annunciation*, Pope Francis is consecrating the world and especially Russia and Ukraine to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The word "consecrate" literally means to "associate with the sacred". So then consecrating ourselves and our world to Mary's Immaculate Heart is a way of acknowledging that we want to be close to her heart always; we want our hearts to become more like hers; that we acknowledge this is the only way to true peace. We see especially on the Feast of the Annunciation the "yes" ("fiat" in Latin) of Mary, the most famous and most important "yes" in all of history. And we know that that singular yes was just one example of a heart that always said yes to God, in the good times and the bad, no matter what the cost to herself, because she knew she could trust in him with all her heart.

In the words of the Consecration to Mary from Pope Francis:

"Therefore, Mother of God and our Mother, to your Immaculate Heart we solemnly entrust and consecrate ourselves, the Church and all humanity, especially Russia and Ukraine. Accept this act that we carry out with confidence and love. Grant that war may end and peace spread throughout the world. The "Fiat" that arose from your heart opened the doors of history to the Prince of Peace. We trust that, through your heart, peace will dawn once more. To you we consecrate the future of the whole human family, the needs and expectations of every people, the anxieties and hopes of the world."

If you would like to receive the full text of the Pope's powerful Consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary please contact the parish office and we will send it to you. Let's continue to pray with persistence for peace in Ukraine, and all parts of the world still torn apart by war and unrest. Mary, Queen of Peace, pray for us!

I thank Fr Paul Gurr for celebrating the Vigil Mass this weekend, as I will be unable to attend since I am celebrating a wedding out of the area. We are all grateful for your wonderful support to our parish Fr Paul!

Message from Sr Kerry

Just a couple of weeks ago I was watching 'Insight' on SBS. The topic for the evening was 'Death Bed Confessions and Promises.' I remember a couple of stories featured that evening, but one is very pronounced in my mind.

One woman was asked her story. She explained that she had cut off communications with her mother due to a family falling out. She spoke of the reason. Sometime later this woman received a message that her mother was dying and that the mother wanted her daughter to visit her. This woman declined the mother's invitation and never met up with her mum prior to the mother's death. I felt a tinge of sadness for the dying mother as obviously she wanted to see her daughter, and I presume, once more open the lines of communication. The daughter had decided against this and never contacted or visited her mother prior to her death.

Of course, I have not walked in this woman's shoes, but I feel very much for her as she now must live with the decision she made. In some ways this is not unlike the Prodigal Son that we hear about today. There is a gamble in this story. What if the father rejects the son? What if the son lost his courage as he approached the home?

There are many people in our world who are estranged is some way. Do you have the courage the stretch out your heart and hand to someone who may be waiting for your invitation to once more join your circle of family or friends?

27 MARCH 2022 - FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT (YEAR C)

First Reading — Joshua 5:9-12 The people of God went to the promised land and there kept the passover.

The Lord said to Joshua, 'Today I have taken the shame of Egypt away from you.'

The Israelites pitched their camp at Gilgal and kept the Passover there on the fourteenth day of the month, at evening in the plain of Jericho. On the morrow of the Passover they tasted the produce of that country, unleavened bread and roasted ears of corn, that same day. From that time, from their first eating of the produce of that country, the manna stopped falling. And having manna no longer, the Israelites fed from that year onwards on what the land of Canaan yielded.

Second Reading — 2 Corinthians 5:17-21 **God reconciled himself to us through Christ**

For anyone who is in Christ, there is a new creation; the old creation has gone, and now the new one is here. It is all God's work. It was God who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the work of handing on this reconciliation. In other words, God in Christ was reconciling the world to himself, not holding men's faults against them, and he has entrusted to us the news that they are reconciled. So we are ambassadors for Christ; it is as though God were appealing through us, and the appeal that we make in Christ's name is: be reconciled to God. For our sake God made the sinless one into sin, so that in him we might become the goodness of God.

Gospel — Luke 15: 1-3, 11-32

Your brother here was dead and has come to life.

The tax collectors and the sinners were all seeking the company of Jesus to hear what he had to say, and the Pharisees and the scribes complained. 'This man' they said 'welcomes sinners and eats with them.' So he spoke this parable to them:

'A man had two sons. The younger said to his father, "Father, let me have the share of the estate that would come to me." So the father divided the property between them. A few days later, the younger son got together everything he had and left for a distant country where he squandered his money on a life of debauchery.

'When he had spent it all, that country experienced a severe famine, and now he began to feel the pinch, so he hired himself out to one of the local inhabitants who put him on his farm to feed the pigs. And he would willingly have filled his belly with the husks the pigs were eating but no one offered him anything. Then he came to his senses and said, "How many of my father's paid servants have more food than they want, and here am I dying of hunger! I will leave this place and go to my father and say: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as one of your paid servants." So he left the place and went back to his father.

'While he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was moved with pity. He ran to the boy, clasped him in his arms and kissed him tenderly. Then his son said, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son." But the father said to his servants, "Quick! Bring out the best robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the calf we have been fattening, and kill it; we are going to have a feast, a celebration, because this son of mine was dead and has come back to life; he was lost and is found." And they began to celebrate.

'Now the elder son was out in the fields, and on his way back, as he drew near the house, he could hear music and dancing. Calling one of the servants he asked what it was all about. "Your brother has come" replied the servant "and your father has killed the calf we had fattened because he has got him back safe and sound." He was angry then and refused to go in, and his father came out to plead with him; but he answered his father, "Look, all these years I have slaved for you and never once disobeyed your orders, yet you never offered me so much as a kid for me to celebrate with my friends. But, for this son of yours, when he comes back after swallowing up your property – he and his women – you kill the calf we had been fattening."

'The father said, "My son, you are with me always and all I have is yours. But it was only right we should celebrate and rejoice, because your brother here was dead and has come to life; he was lost and is found."'
