flections on the Mass – Music and Singing-Vital to our experience

Music is an integral part of our participation in liturgy and participation in the work of God. For music and song in the liturgy, as Pope St John Paul II said, is "*in a certain way, communion with the Trinity*". Our hearts and minds are raised more easily to connection with God and one another. Through using our whole bodies as we sing, music and song give a deeper expression to our prayer. As St Augustine – "*he who sings prays twice*".

Similarly, in singing together we again display our unity as the body of Christ. "One cannot find anything more religious and more joyful in sacred celebrations than a whole congregation expressing its faith and devotion in song" (Vatican II – Instruction on Music in the Liturgy). Therefore, the primary music minister in the liturgy is us, the assembly. The role of the choir is to lead us in fulfilling our vital and integral role in ensuring the liturgy is experienced as fully as possible. Your voice adds to the fullest experience of the liturgy.

The liturgy comprises a variety of different forms of music and song into which we're invited to participate. Some of these are:

- Acclamations: such as the 'Alleluia' or 'Profession of Faith' or 'Great Amen'. These are joyful vocalisations of praise and worship.
- Hymns: Songs of praise which may include the Gloria, Hymn of Praise after Communion and the Recessional Hymn. Note that the hymn after communion is not a reflection song but rather a hymn of praise of God and his Eucharistic gift.
- Processional Song: A song accompanying these liturgical actions Entrance, Offertory and Communion.
- Responsorial Psalm: This is our response to the Word of God we heard in the 1st Reading. The psalm, preferably sung, gives voice to our response.

I hope you have enjoyed these reflections over the past 8 weeks. My prayer is that through them you have come to a deeper appreciation of our celebration of the Eucharist and eagerness to participate fully, consciously and actively, uniting together as body of Christ.

First Reading– Wisdom 9:13-18 Who can comprehend the will of God. What man indeed can know the intentions of God? Who can divine the will of the Lord? The reasonings of mortals are unsure and our intentions unstable; for a perishable body presses down the soul, and this tent of clay weighs down the teeming mind. It is hard enough for us to work out what is on earth, laborious to know what lies within our reach; who, then, can discover what is in the heavens? As for your intention, who could have learnt it, had you not granted Wisdom and sent your holy spirit from above? Thus have the paths of those on earth been straightened and men been taught what pleases you, and saved, by Wisdom. Responsorial Psalm - In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge

## Second Reading — Philemon 9-10,12-17 Receive him, not as a slave anymore, but as a very dear brother

This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father I became while wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you, and with him – I could say – a part of my own self. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a blood-brother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me.

### **Gospel Acclamation:**

Alleluia, Alleluia! Let your face shine on your servant, and teach me your laws. Alleluia!

### **Gospel** — Luke 14: 25-33 **All who do not renounce their possessions cannot be my disciples.**

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. 'If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.'
