Message from Fr Duane

This Sunday is "Social Justice Sunday", and the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference have published a powerful Statement entitled "Truth and Peace: A Gospel Word in a Violent World". I encourage you all to read the statement in full – it can be found relatively easily on the internet free of charge or feel free to contact me or the parish office if you have difficulty accessing it. I share here just a very brief taste of the statement.

"The first step to peace is speaking the truth", write the Bishops, as they lament what they call a "post-truth world" where many believe that "there is only your truth and my truth, your facts and my facts; and truth can be manufactured or at least manipulated in any way you choose". As Christians, we believe in a God of truth, who has revealed in Christ the truth of the dignity of every person, and has called us to be co-workers with him in making peace:

"Instead of closing in on ourselves and clinging to our own positions and convictions, we choose instead to welcome opportunities to listen to others and understand what they think and why...A renewed commitment to a culture of dialogue based on encounter in social relationships and in international relations would not only break down misunderstanding and build trust; it would lead us to discover more deeply the truth that the other is not my enemy but is my sister, my brother, even my friend."

The Bishops remind us that we can all begin making peace by sincerely seeking the truth in our everyday encounters with one another, and in our interactions with social media and other news outlets, which, the Bishops point out, are increasingly partisan, ideological and sensationalist. May we all rise above these divisive trends of our time, in our families, our friendships, and our parish. During the sign of peace at Mass this weekend, let's especially remember the truth of the infinite dignity of every person, and pray and work together for the peace that springs from this truth.

25 AUGUST - THE TWENTY FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading - Joshua 24:1-2, 15-18

We will serve the Lord God, because he is our God.

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel together at Shechem; then he called the elders, leaders, judges and scribes of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Then Joshua said to all the people, 'If you will not serve the Lord, choose today whom you wish to serve, whether the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are now living. As for me and my House, we will serve the Lord.'

The people answered, 'We have no intention of deserting the Lord and serving other gods! Was it not the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors out of the land of Egypt, the house of slavery, who worked those great wonders before our eyes and preserved us all along the way we travelled and among all the peoples through whom we journeyed? What is more, the Lord drove all those peoples out before us, as well as the Amorites who used to live in this country. We too will serve the Lord, for he is our God.'

Second Reading - Ephesians 5:21-32 This is the great mystery, it applies to Christ and the Church

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body – and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and the Church.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia! Your words, Lord, are spirit and life: you have the words of everlasting life. Alleluia!

Gospel - John 6:60-69

Lord, whom shall we go to? You have the words of everlasting life.

After hearing his doctrine many of the followers of Jesus said, 'This is intolerable language. How could anyone accept it?' Jesus was aware that his followers were complaining about it and said, 'Does this upset you? What if you should see the Son of Man ascend to where he was before?

'It is the spirit that gives life, the flesh has nothing to offer. The words I have spoken to you are spirit and they are life.

'But there are some of you who do not believe.' For Jesus knew from the outset those who did not believe, and who it was that would betray him. He went on, 'This is why I told you that no one could come to me unless the Father allows him.' After this, many of his disciples left him and stopped going with him.

Then Jesus said to the Twelve, 'What about you, do you want to go away too?' Simon Peter answered, 'Lord, who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe; we know that you are the Holy One of God.'
