Where does the Nativity scene come from?

The first live reproduction of the outdoor Christmas nativity was made by St Francis of Assisi for the event he staged in Greccio, Italy, in 1223. It was a way of communicating the true meaning of Christmas. The idea proved so popular that it soon spread throughout the Christian world.



The story of the nativity comes from the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. Luke's account describes the journey of Joseph and Mary to Bethlehem, where they must go to be counted in the census ordered by Caesar Augustus. Unable to find any room at the inn, they take refuge in a stable used to shelter animals. Here Jesus is born and laid in a manger filled with hay. In the hills overlooking Bethlehem an angel tells the shepherds of Jesus' Birth. Matthew's account tells of a brilliant star that appears, marking the birthplace of Jesus, and of the three kings that follow its light to find the Christ Child.


The traditional grouping of wise men and farm folk is symbolic of the universal nature of Christianity and emphasizes God's desire to embrace all people. The shepherds carry the richness of the Earth's harvest, and the first to arrive carries a dove, the symbol of peace. The angel, in bringing the message of the birth to the shepherds, is symbolic of the way God reaches out to all mankind with a message of peace. The wise men are traditionally kings with gifts of riches to symbolize how wealth and wisdom come to kneel before a greater King. Baby Jesus in a humble crib is at the very centre.

Since the time of St Francis, the practice has spread around the world in pageants, church reproductions, neighbourhood rituals, professionally staged plays where huge casts including live animals are utilized, and of course the school plays where sometimes the imaginative interpretation of the script provides highly original versions of the events.

My dear people,

We have been listening these past few weeks to the voices of the prophet Isaiah and the last of all the prophets, John the Baptist. Today the Church focuses her attention on Our Lady, the model of all who wait on God.

Holding on to a sense of expectation when we've already heard the story year after year is not easy. That's why we've needed this period of Advent to reflect on the fact that God is always coming to us - at **every** moment in our lives. We need to train ourselves to sense His presence. It is, I suppose, a good definition of a holy person - one who is constantly aware of God, and thus open to what God is asking at each moment. It would seem that the meaning of our English word GOD is 'the One who calls' .

This week we return to the familiar and comforting stories of angels and shepherds and magi. To appreciate it all anew we have to try and go behind the scenes, and attempt to understand how this must have sounded to someone hearing the news for the first time. St Luke is trying to tell us how remarkable this Child will be: Son of the Most High, preserver of David's kingdom, Ruler without end. The promise made to David - that his House would last for ever - seemed not to have been kept, for David's kingdom came crashing down at the hands of the Babylonians. What good is a prophecy proved false by history ?

Imagine how the first Christians, steeped in Jewish tradition, must have received the news. God **had** fulfilled His promise and restored the Davidic line through Christ, legally adopted by Joseph who was of the House of David. Christ did establish a kingdom, but not of this world, and therefore one that will last forever. God had kept His promise after all ! And in a much greater way than expected.

It all comes about through the agency of an unknown girl in a relatively unknown town—not exactly material for royalty. But Mary seems ready for anything God will ask. Though Christ's kingdom is quite different than the one expected by the Jews at the time, it is still a kingdom in which **obedience** brings about the fulfilment of the King's wishes. Mary is presented to us as the model of that obedience which brings about the establishment of Christ's kingdom in the world.



There are obvious implications for us. God waits on us and our consent, as He waited on Mary's, to enter our world. My examination of conscience each day should address the question as to what I might have done to thwart God's purpose. My lack of love, my lack of justice denies God's entry into the world. It is staggering to think what God might be able to do in my life and through me if, like Our Lady, I would give myself entirely to Him.

We find our lives of faith difficult. Like Our Lady we are often 'troubled' by God's message, and we 'wonder' at its relevance to our lives. Like her, we must be patient as the fullness of the message is made known to us only by the passing of the years. Our prayers to Our Lady, such an indispensable part of Catholic life, should not always be for selfish requests. Rather, they should be petitions asking Her to help us say YES to God, and never to give up in the face of seeming paradox.
