## INVITATION TO THE CHRISM MASS – WEDNESDAY 28<sup>th</sup> MARCH at 7.30pm

Each year during Holy Week the Chrism Mass is celebrated at St Francis Xavier Cathedral. If you have never participated, you are missing one of the most solemn and significant liturgies of our Church. During the Mass, the Priests of the Diocese renew their commitment to priestly service; Bishop Brian blesses the oil of catechumens (for Baptism) and the oil of the sick (for Anointing of the Sick) and consecrates the oil of chrism (for Baptism, Confirmation, the Ordination of clergy and the consecration of altars). The oils are then distributed to clergy to be used during the year with their local communities. Everyone is warmly invited to join Bishop Brian and our clergy to celebrate this significant event in the life of the Church.

### PALM SUNDAY 25<sup>th</sup> March 2018





My dear people,

We have entered the week of Our Lord's Pasion, truly the most holy week of all time. These days have much to teach us—let us listen with love to what they have to say.

Today we began with the blessing of the palms, recalling Our Lord's entry in triumph into Jerusalem. But He weeps—He knows the hearts of men. Today they cry HOSANNA—in a few days they will cry CRUCIFY HIM. WE HAVE NO KING BUT CAESAR. Man's heart is a fickle thing. And our hearts? Have we ever cried out: "Away with Him" in the hour of temptation? Did Our Lord weep for me on that first Palm Sunday?



Tomorrow, we find Him in the Temple. It has become a market place, not a house of prayer. So He cleanses it in holy anger. Have we ever sold His love for some passing trifle? Let us ask His pardon.

Tuesday comes, one day closer to the end. His enemies throng about Him. He challenges them with the story of the vineyard and the unjust tenants. They do not listen. They plot His death even as the tenants plotted to kill the son in the story. The story is for us also—we are stewards of the gifts of God. Do we act justly towards Him who has made us just by the Death of His Son?

Wednesday is known as Spy Wednesday, because the Gospel of Judas is read. Judas is on the watch. If he cannot catch Jesus in His words he will take Him captive in the Garden. Greed has caught Judas. Temptation like this can hold us captive too. But why sell God when He offers us the everlasting wealth of heaven? We must not play the traitor. Let us ask His grace to remain steadfast and loyal in all our combats with Hell.

Then Holy Thursday, the very jewel of the week. Jerusalem is busy with the Passover preparations. Christ is the true Paschal lamb—the next day He will be the real Passover. That night He looks forward to that hour when He will give Himself in sacrifice. He ensures that all Christians of all time will be able to share in His sacrifice, and so He institutes the Mass and the priesthood. And He gives us His most precious gift—the gift of Himself in the Blessed Sacrament. He dwells in our Tabernacles so that we will never be alone.

Holy Thursday is a day of great joy—the mysteries of the Priesthood and the Mass are celebrated in two separate Masses: the Mass of the Holy Oils and the Mass of the Last Supper. Because very few people could get to a Mass on Holy Thursday morning, the Mass of the Oils, held only in Cathedral Churches, is held here in our Cathedral on Wednesday night. During that Mass the Bishop and all the priests of the Diocese renew the vows of their ordination, and the Holy Oils to be used in the Sacraments for the coming year are consecrated. For it is from the Death and Resurrection of Christ that the Sacraments receive their power.

On Holy Thursday night it is the Mass and the Blessed Eucharist that are the focus. To highlight the permanent presence of Christ in the Eucharist, even after Mass, the Blessed Sacrament is carried in procession to the Altar of Repose. The Church invites us to spend an hour with Our Lord some time before 10pm. "Could you not watch one hour with me" Our Lord said to the Apostles in Gethsemane. In His agony He wished the company of His friends.

The trial followed. And, worse, Peter, the rock of the Church, denies he even knew Christ. On Friday morning we walk with Him as we follow the Stations of the Cross. In the afternoon we venerate His Cross and receive Holy Communion. Let us thank Him for His redeeming love.

So with Our Lady and the holy women we leave the dead Christ in His tomb. We spend Saturday in hope, waiting for the victory. By tradition the Church celebrates no Sacraments today—she waits at the tomb. You will notice on the Parish programme that there are no Confessions on Saturday. The Church presumes that all have already made their preparations, and have already been to Holy Communion on the Thursday and again on the Friday. Easter Sunday is not an isolated event—it cannot be celebrated apart from Holy Thursday and Good Friday. The three days are really part of one event.

On Saturday night, that most holy of nights, the great Easter Candle is blessed and lit, symbol that the risen Christ is the Light of the world. Bathed in its radiance, we are invited to once more give ourselves entirely to God by renewing the vows of our Baptism.

Let us spend this Holy Week better than we have ever spent one before. The outcome is worth it. Christ lives. He wishes to make His home in me.
