

My dear people,

The widow in Sidon and the widow in the Temple gave of their livelihood to total strangers. It's the kind of selflessness that inspires people to enter religious life, or to dedicate their lives to working with and for others who are not a part of their own family. For over two thousand years people have been hearing of the widow who shared her last bit of food with Elijah, and for two thousand years we have known of the widow's mite. Each age, each congregation must hear the stories in the light of their own times. The same Scripture accounts inspire different responses as they are heard differently.

The time was when today's Gospel provided the preacher with a marvellous opportunity for a great rousing sermon on raising money for the parish. Perhaps inappropriate today (not that we don't need it!). Today's Gospel <u>is</u> a challenge to give of our resources to those in greater need.

There are many kinds of hunger in our world. Hunger for food, for education, for faith, for freedom, hunger for the right to live in the dignity that belongs to being



human. Today's readings do challenge us to want to do something. Hunger, malnutrition, and starvation are as old as the human race — people have died in every generation simply because they did not have the food that lands in our garbage cans every day.

A suggestion. Each year a certain number of collections are foisted on us. Sometimes we complain, sometimes we don't. Some of the collections are worthwhile, some we're a little suspicious of. Sometimes they catch us shorthanded, sometimes they don't. Certainly we all should be giving part of our income to the poor. My suggestion is that we decide to set aside a certain percentage of our income each week. In one year it would certainly amount to something. Then there will always be a source from which to draw when a worthy cause comes along. Or we may decide on a certain cause and give our contribution half-yearly or yearly, and so on.

Choose your cause wisely. One of the first great public appeals I can remember as a young priest was the Darwin Disaster. It touched many hearts. But I was appalled to learn that ten years after, there was still money in the bank that had not been distributed. (Did you know that the greatest single donor to that appeal was Pope St Paul VI?). And I was dismayed to read in the Herald a week ago that two agencies for Drought Relief are being investigated. One fund used one-third of donations for wages for personnel, and one-third of that was for the Executive Officer. You might remember that I encouraged you to support the St Vincent de Paul appeal because they are present in almost every town in New South Wales, and are aware of the situation first-hand.

There are certainly plenty of worthy causes — St Vincent de Paul helping needy cases in our own suburb; the missions of Mother Teresa; Catholic Mission, a Pontifical Society, overseen by the Pope; Caritas, the Catholic Church's own relief agency, present in most countries.

Our contribution may not be earth-shattering, but our religion demands it. After all, the widow's mite only added up to less than one penny, but it did not escape Our Lord's notice. Togs Graham Selvnike.
