My dear people,

The season of Advent (at first sight) appears a bit confusing. This relates to our living in the Southern Hemisphere. Christmas appears at the end of our working year, and Christmas celebrations "down under" are actually end-of-year parties with no religious content whatsoever. The commercial world is interested only in making money from the buying of gifts — and many of these gifts are simply "payment" for favours received from each other during the year. For many, Christmas simply heralds the beginning of our summer holiday. Advent easily gets lost in the hustle and bustle.

In the Northern Hemisphere, the end of the working year is 30 June, and Christmas is more easily recognisable as a great religious festival – and Advent sits more comfortably as a spiritual preparation. The Latin word ADVENTUM simply means 'coming', but as the Liturgy spells it out, the term more accurately refers to 'comings'. It is important to understand this in order to discover what the Church is trying to say.

The first part of Advent (from the first Sunday to 16 December) features the coming of Jesus at the end of time. It speaks of His coming in majesty and glory, as Judge of the living and the dead. This emphasis doesn't exactly have a Christmas ring to it! The message is rather fearful and forceful. "Be constantly on the watch! Stay awake! You do not know when the appointed time will come!" (MARK 13:33). The Church is not interested in the false sentimentality that surrounds Christmas. For the first half of Advent the Church is showing us why this Child has come into the world – He has come not to bring peace but a sword. His teaching will divide the world. From the time of the Incarnation we are judged by our acceptance or rejection of this Child.

The Second Coming at the end of time will happen as surely as did the first at Bethlehem. So having set her sights on the reason for this coming, the Church from 17 December until 24 December looks back to Bethlehem and acts as if she were awaiting His birth for the first time. The people of those days did not know what to expect – we do, with 2,000 years of insight.

We know that this baby is actually the Second Person of the Holy Trinity and, sent by His Father, He freely comes into our world to offer Himself in sacrifice – "for us and for our salvation" as we recite in the Creed. From Christmas to Epiphany, the Church will stand in wonder and awe at this tremendous expression of love on the part of God.

Advent, then, is a kind of reverse order, but it makes sense when you discover the reason. The early Fathers of the Church also speak of a Third Coming – the coming of Christ each day into our lives, especially in the Holy Eucharist. It is by no coincidence that BETHLEHEM in Hebrew means "the House of Bread", and that the English word CHRISTMAS means "Christ's Mass". We celebrate Christ's birth by offering to the Father Christ's death. For this little baby came to die. The Orthodox Christians make this very obvious in their Christmas icons. Mary places the child not in a manger but in a miniature tomb, the swaddling clothes reminding us of the shroud and the linen cloths used for wrapping the bodies of the dead.

How best can we observe Advent, especially in the midst of a secular culture? It is not a season of penance like Lent. Rather, it is a time of special prayerfulness and reflection. We can follow the Church's liturgy more carefully than usual, attending Mass and devotions more often, spending more time in private prayer. This will help us to open our hearts to the moving accounts of Christ's birth and the people who prepared for it. It will help us face courageously the powerful significance of Christ's Second Coming – for most of us it will be the moment of our death. So as we look to the past to Christ's birth, and as we look to the future to His coming at the end of time, we realise that we live, realistically, only now. We are Christians now. To be a real force, Advent must help us recognise Christ's presence now. If the celebration of Advent and Christmas does not touch my real life today, then it is no more than a pretty picture hanging on the wall or a card in the post. It is up to us to make Advent a time of spiritual renewal, a time to begin again – a time to pray more, to help more, to give more, to love more.
