#### My Dear People,

The Catholic Bishops of Australia have issued a letter in preparation for the upcoming Federal Election. It can be found in full at www.catholic.org.au In part, the Bishops remind us that our Christian faith is not a private matter — it shapes how we live our lives in public. The electoral process gives us the opportunity to use our vote for the benefit of the whole community.

No political party, of course, fully aligns with Catholic teaching, but we have a responsibility to present our views clearly and, if necessary, to disagree — all the time remembering that <u>all</u> of us are made in God's image. We all have a



role in promoting peace. It means speaking to our fellow Australians with love and not hate, with respect not contempt, with understanding not indifference.

Prayer is an essential part of the process of discerning how to vote. Democratic processes stripped of transcendent truth risk becoming soulless. Majority parties can easily decide issues based on power rather than truth and the common good. Some now laugh at the idea of the common good — it is basic Catholic teaching that we look beyond our own needs and desires to consider the interests of the broader community.

Governments play a crucial role in addressing any structural problems affecting people, in providing key services to all Australians, and in ensuring there is an adequate safety net for low-income and vulnerable families and individuals.

One of the key principles of Catholic social teaching is a preference <u>for the poor and vulnerable</u>. The greater the needs of people, the greater the responsibility we have to respond to their needs. Clearly, this includes people who are <u>homeless</u> or struggling to keep a roof over their heads. It also includes others who are victims of violence and exclusion, particularly survivors of <u>child sexual abuse</u> to whom we must offer every support. Much appreciated is the bipartisan support in the Federal Parliament for both the National Apology to victims and survivors of institutional child sexual abuse, and the National Redress Scheme. These are just two examples of the contribution politicians can make to the common good.

We also welcome the bipartisan commitment to the National Disability Insurance Scheme and the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability.

The dignity of employment must be a key aim of any government. Many families and individuals struggle to make ends meet. Catholic charities and agencies make an enormous contribution. Regional, rural and remote Australians deserve better access to adequate <u>healthcare</u>. And the gap must be closed between indigenous Australians and the rest of the population. <u>Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples</u> continue to suffer grave disadvantage.

Migration has helped shape the Catholic Church and transform Australia. Millions of our brothers and sisters have been forced to flee their homelands for fear of persecution, or through displacement because of war or famine. We are called to respect and welcome them. Regardless of how they arrive in Australia, all <u>asylum seekers</u> should have their claims processed in Australia, according to international conventions. That includes resettling all remaining <u>refugees</u> on Manus Island and Nauru in Australia.

The dignity of all human lives must be recognised. <u>Euthanasia and assisted suicide</u> put some of the most vulnerable people in our community at risk by endorsing, and legislating, the judgment that some people's lives are no longer of value. Governments must provide better funding for <u>palliative care</u> so that all Australians have access, not just the few. Governments must also provide for sustainable <u>aged care</u> services.

We recognise the human dignity of unborn children, and the great challenge many women face when confronted by an unexpected or difficult pregnancy. What factors are causing women to take the agonising decision of <u>abortion</u>? No society can be judged healthy when the womb itself becomes a dangerous place.

Australia is seeing rising levels of <u>violence</u> in personal relationships and families. Resourcing sound social and pastoral education, free of ideological theory, is an essential task of a social welfare state.

For more than a century, the Catholic Church has advocated the value of work and a just living wage.

<u>Climate change</u> is a complex reality of international import. It is both social and environmental, with solutions Pope Francis says demand "an integrated approach to combating poverty, restoring dignity to the excluded, and at the same time protecting nature".

One in nine people in the world goes hungry each day. We call on the incoming government to allocate more money to the Australian aid budget.

These are some of the important issues for Catholics to consider when casting their vote.
