ANNUAL LEAVE

This is my final weekend of Masses before my 2 months of leave, taking my mum to visit my sister and her new baby in Canada. This includes "long service leave" (as the usual leave allowance for priests is 4 weeks a year). I decided to ask Bishop Brian for this extended leave at this time for a number of reasons, including this being the first opportunity in 3 years that my mum and I will be able to see my sister, her husband and my other nephew, Jai, as well as the precious opportunity for my mum and I to enjoy (and help out with) my brand new nephew, Nate. I hope that my time away will also be refreshing in body and soul and help me serve you all better on my return from Canada in September. I will officially return to parish work on the weekend of 9-10 September.

In my absence, Sister Kerry Gardiner will be the main contact, and I thank Kerry for taking on even more of a leadership role in my absence. Kerry will be supported in this role by Melissa Bridges (parish secretary), George Attard (sacristan) as well as the many other generous volunteers whose dedicated service behind the scenes keep the parish going. There are corresponding lay leaders at West Wollongong, led by Terry Clout in my absence.

COLLECTIONS

This past week at the annual Clergy In-Service, there was much material shared that will hopefully improve my ministry, and that of all our clergy. Among the more mundane but essential topics was that of collections. It has been mandated by the Diocese that 2 collections will take place at Masses from now on, returning to the norm of the first collection taking place at the Offertory, and the second collection after Communion. The first collection will go to the Diocesan Clergy Remuneration Fund, and the second collection (as well as the tap point device at the church door) will go to the parish.

Message from Sr Kerry

This Sunday we celebrate *Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people*.

I have been very fortunate to have had two appointments to Walgett; a very indigenous town. I witnessed much suffering while there. The attached photo is that of a woman's arm. Out of respect I won't name this woman but I know her well. The six names tattooed on her arm are six of her eight children. These six named children have all died. The eldest girl dropped dead at the local swimming pool while eating her lunch. Can you imagine six of your eight children predeceasing you? Life would be tough! I was there when a most delightful 6 year old aboriginal girl was bitten by a brown snake and died. The most powerful lesson I learnt was when I went to visit the wife of an indigenous man who had died. Walgett is a town that doesn't experience much rain, but this weekend it had rain. I arrived at the house and had to jump the muddy puddles that should have been a gutter. I made the comment of how nice it was to see the rain. I wasn't ready for the response to my very superficial comment. The wife said, 'Sr, we love to see the rain after someone has died. Now we know their footprints are wiped from the earth and now they are at peace. If we don't have rain a dust storm does the same thing.' What indigenous story touches you?

A huge thank you to everyone in the parish and St Pius school who gave so much energy and time into making our Family Mass such a wonderful celebration. What a wonderful morning we all had!

This coming week Fr Duane commences his leave and travels with family to be with family. Let's hold Fr Duane in our prayers and thoughts. May it be everything Fr Duane hopes this time will be.

He said to them, 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest. Start off now, but remember, I am sending you out like lambs among wolves. Carry no purse, no haversack, no sandals. Salute no one on the road. 'Whatever house you go into, let your first words be, "Peace to this house!" And if a man of peace lives there, your peace will go and rest on him; if not, it will come back to you. Stay in the same house, taking what food and drink they have to offer, for the labourer deserves his wages; do not move from house to house.
